Stories Our Parents and Grandparents (and Maybe Even Great-Grandparents) Told Us

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If we are fortunate, our parents and grandparents told us lots of stories about their lives and the lives of others. If we are very fortunate, our great-grandparents told us stories. Some of those stories may have focused on ordinary daily life (e.g., work, school, cooking and eating) or unexpected surprises (e.g. accidents, severe weather). Some of those stories may have focused on how bigger events in the world affected them—e.g., the Great Depression, World War II. We will share some of those stories in conversation and writing.

- 6. Which of the aforementioned stories have made the most lasting impression on you?

- 7. What has made some of these stories especially memorable?
- 8. What do you think you have gained from hearing these stories?
- 9. Which family members were fond of embellishing stories?
- 10. In what ways did they embellish the stories?
- 11. Which of the aforementioned stories do you most enjoy retelling?
- 12. What stories have you enjoyed telling to children in your family? Why do you tell them?
